# Together we do more good

No matter how you spin it, 2021 was a year of uncertainty, concern and sorrow for many. Words and phrases like isolation, social distancing, contact tracing, quarantine and panic shopping took new meaning. For many, it was the worst year of their lives. Yet, in the midst of turmoil, we saw the people engaging in service around us remain deeply caring and generous when it came to helping their neighbors. Our medical professionals and first responders never stopped working, despite personal risk of contracting the deadly virus. Daycare centers kept their doors open to the children of essential workers. Volunteers continued to assist the most vulnerable members of our community. Our schools distributed food for families with children. And our churches opened their doors to students who needed a place to study.


Indeed, many caring hands of the community helped us survive the pandemic. Our Community was generous with its support throughout the region. As early as March 2020, the Community Foundation was able to respond directly to the crisis by establishing the COVID19 Relief Fund for our area not-for-profits providing food, housing, utilities, daycare and other critical needs. The Community's response was extraordinary, with contributions to this fund exceeding \$165,000. Our localities supported us

by contributing over \$250,000 to our efforts from their CARES funding. Our COVID19 coalition task force and grants committee met regularly to review applications and award grants from the fund. We have continued to disperse COVID related funds well into 2021.

While few activities were normal in 2021, we attempted to maintain ongoing activities of the Foundation as best we could. The Foundation awarded over \$330,000 in annual grants to 78 area not-for-profits. We provided over \$25,000 in scholarships funds. Donors created five new funds, bringing our portfolio of funds to a total of 72. At the end of calendar year 2021, assets of the Foundation total \$7.6 million, a 27% increase over the previous fiscal year.

Looking ahead, the Foundation will continue to offer multiple opportunities to assist in effective charitable giving. We hope that you will review your gift planning for the coming year and consider the benefits of creating a fund with the Foundation. The Foundation exists to enrich the future of Rockbridge, Bath and Alleghany Counties. We are here to help you play a part so that you can make an impact now and in perpetuity.







which includes ten as an independent foundation (CFRBA). Established in 2001 as the Rockbridge Area Community Foundation, we later became the Community Foundation for Rockbridge, Bath and Allegany in 2011. The support of many individuals, families, and businesses has had a tremendous impact on our growth.

After the Community Foundation became independent in December of 2011, we were able make our first grants totaling \$32,000. After 10 years of community support and growth, we have been able to grant a cumulative \$2.5 million to nonprofit organizations, projects and programs across the Community Foundation's service area. In 2021, we will be awarding over \$300,000 in community grants and an additional \$30,000 in scholarships.

CFRBA has become a vibrant community foundation through the giving of those who establish funds for causes they support. Grants come from the more than 70 funds, primarily endowments, established by individuals, families, and businesses to support arts and culture, community betterment, education, health, and human services. This includes 36 Donor -Advised Funds, 2 Unrestricted Funds, 18 Agency Funds, 6 Designated Funds and 6 Scholarship Funds with assets which have grown to \$7.6 million dollars.








"CFRBA has been with us from the inception of our organization in 2013.

# Walker Program

Seven local entrepreneurs were awarded a total of \$85,000 in



small business grants from the Harry Lee & Eliza Walker Entrepreneurship Program through the Community Foundation. Each of the awardees completed an eight-week business skills training course, crafted a business plan, and submitted a funding request to the Walker Program board. The Walker Program is administered by a fifteen-member volunteer board with representatives from the small business community, civic and social organizations, educational institutions, and business training agencies. Since the launch of the program, fundraising efforts have attracted more than \$160,000 for the grant pool. More than 100 individuals have contributed to the fund, in addition to others who pitched in to communal offerings from church and civic organizations. The Walker Program board remains committed to the task of ensuring adequate funding for all entrepreneurs who complete the training and whose plans are judged viable, for as long as community support endures. Four of the businesses open in early 2021, while three more are planned in 2022.

Allyson DuVall received a grant to support her new salon, Inspired to Enhance Lexington, which opened at 9 S. Jefferson St. in the space occupied for several decades by Wendall Brown's barber shop. DuVall, an experienced beauty professional with a thriving salon in Salem, VA, is a native of Lexington with aspirations to open a cosmetology



school in the area. She also owns and operates a beauty business consulting service. "I don't know how I'll ever find the words to express my gratitude, so instead I'll prove it by what I do, by reinvesting in the community of Lexington and its residents through mentorship, cosmetology education and entrepreneurship, business consulting, while enhancing the opportunities and confidence of its residents through healthy hair care and image enhancing," said DuVall.

Photographer Chandi Stewart formalized her passion for what she calls "emotional storytelling through photos" in her business, an endeavor that began when she started snapping pictures in the summer of 2019. She has photographed newlyweds, newborns, and new graduates, generally out of doors. With the Walker Program grant, she opened a storefront studio stocked with props and lighting that will



allow her client and herself to be less weather-dependent. Chandi Stewart added, "My favorite part about being in the Walker Program was being challenged by professionals who not only gave good advice but were hands-on leaders in this program."

Leonard Stewart's Walker business grant will allowed him to purchase equipment and market his new mobile car detailing service, Valley Pro Clean. Stewart, who works as the Director of Safety and Environmental Health for Carilion Rockbridge Community Hospital, has been detailing cars from his home. With the mobile unit deployed, he provides on-the-spot services around the county. "The Walker Program has helped me walk through the proper steps of starting a business and the grant

will ensure that I am able to be well prepared for a sustainable future," said Leonard Stewart. "I look forward to the chance to help those who will come after me by helping them realize their dream of someday owning a successful business."



One entrepreneur who started from scratch is Justina Eason, owner of Tina's Balloon Emporium. Eason, is currently employed as the dispatcher



at Rockbridge Area Transportation System, used her grant to launch her sideline business offering balloon bouquets, specialized stuffed balloons, and balloon installations for weddings, events and other parties. "The best part of the Walker Program has been meeting people who are willing to help you work through each step and who stay with you afterwards," Eason said, citing the ongoing practical support offered by graphic designers, lawyers, marketing professionals and others as she worked toward her launch.

Additionally there are three new start-up grants to aspiring entrepreneurs in our area. Micah Henderson, David Dunn, and Melissa Wooding. Micah Henderson's business, Seasons Tow & Go, will be an on-call vehicle towing service, working locally in Rockbridge and regionally along the I-81 corridor, where there is often a shortage of available tow trucks. David Dunn's Head to Toe Memorial Services will offer cleaning and maintenance of gravestones to individuals, families, or cemetery caretakers, along with the ability to reset stones that have settled or fallen. Melissa Wooding's Coffee Corner will be a retail expansion of her homebased baked goods business called Let Them Eat Cake. It will be located inside the headquarters of the Rockbridge Regional Library and will feature slices of cake, danishes, muffins or cupcakes, along with a selection of teas, coffee, cocoa and water.
